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Introduction

The purpose of this directory is to help connect climate finance with those who need it. Climate finance refers to financing channelled by national, regional, and international entities for climate change mitigation and adaptation.

Vanuatu, among the world's most vulnerable countries to climate change and disasters, has a significant and immediate need for investment in climate change mitigation and adaptation. The amount of climate finance approved and disbursed to date fulfils only a small portion of actual needs. A study carried out by the Stockholm Environment Institute revealed that Vanuatu had received roughly USD 49.4 million of climate finance from 2010-2014, with the majority (57.2%) supporting mitigation activities.¹

The directory details known climate finance sources available to individuals, communities, organisations, government bodies, and the private sector in Vanuatu. Financing amounts, eligibility requirements, and focus areas vary widely depending on the source.

The directory is divided into five sections:

- I. **Small-Scale Funds**: small² funding sources, typically grants, with open applications for individuals, communities, and civil society/non-profit organisations;
- II. **Large-Scale Funds**: large³ funding sources characterised by diversified financing mechanisms and generally for government, international/regional organisations, civil society/non-profit organisations, and the private sector;
- III. **Private Sector Financing**: financing sources or networks exclusively for private sector stakeholders:
- IV. **Bilateral Funding Sources**: bilateral funding provided by national development aid organisations, national development banks, diplomatic missions or foreign consuls; and
- V. **International Agencies**: international (including non-governmental, regional, and intergovernmental) organisations.

Please note that this directory is not exhaustive. It merely serves as a starting point for those pursuing or researching climate finance opportunities.

I. Small-Scale Funds

This section includes small funding sources, typically grants, with open applications for individuals, communities, and civil society/non-profit organisations. Consult the websites of the respective funds for further details. Small scale is defined as funding sources that fund projects equal to or less than VUV 15 million.

All these sources can theoretically fund community projects. Some of the sources listed also fund non-climate change/disaster related areas, such as infrastructure and economic development.

The table below compares the various sources and their funding caps, expressed in their original currencies and approximate equivalent in Vatu, as of November 2017.

Background	The Asia Foundation undertakes grant making with organizations as a collaborative process of problem identification and strategic planning within our areas of programming interest. Our programs address critical issues affecting Asia in the 21st century—governance and law, economic development, women's empowerment, environment, and regional cooperation. In addition, our Books for Asia and professional exchange programs are among the ways the Asia Foundation encourages Asia's continued development as a peaceful, just, and thriving region of the world.
	In 2009-2011, the Asia Foundation funded the Pacific Islands Disaster Risk Management Program in Vanuatu.
Eligibility	The Foundation directs its support to activities that are within its current interests and are likely to have a wide effect. Most of the Foundation's grants are made to organizations in Asia. The Foundation does not make grants either to individuals or to U.S-based organizations.

Financing	The Asia Foundation provides grants of an unspecified amount.
Applying	 Review The Asia Foundation's program areas. The letter of inquiry should include: a very brief introduction about the grant-seeking organization, a brief project description, and budget estimate. After receiving the letter, Foundation staff may reply informing the grant seeker as to whether or not the project fits within the The Asia Foundation's interests. If it does, Foundation staff may ask the grant seeker to submit a formal proposal and/or raise questions for clarification of purposed project. There is no grant application form.

The CFLI focuses on funding projects with long-term, sustainable goals that enhance the local community. Recipient organizations are expected to make a contribution in cash or in kind. The program is widely recognized as making a significant contribution to genuine development and capacity-building in the region.

Background	The Christensen Fund pursues its mission mainly through place-based investments in a small number of regions with exceptional cultural and biological diversity. The Melanesian program is focused around increasing understanding about alternative development paths, in particular the merits and practical applicability of approaches rooted in Melanesian land-based values and biocultural diversity. Key strategies within these themes include the development and use of culturally-grounded and environmentally-informed curricula in schools and community education programs; support for the strengthening and diversification of civil society organizations; and the development of networks of people and organizations engaged in biocultural education, expression and revitalization.

background	Le Fonds de coopération économique, sociale et culturelle pour le Pacifique, also known as le Fonds Pacifique, is France's main instrument for regional cooperation in the Pacific. Funded by credits from the Ministry of Foreign Affairs, it contributes, through this cooperation with the independent states of the Pacific, to the regional integration of New Caledonia, French Polynesia and the Wallis and Futuna Islands. In 2017 it contributed EUR 1,380,000 after an 8% tax on the reserve budget.		
	Based on the current budget, the Pacific Fund subsidizes some forty projects per year, providing an average amount of co-financing of just over EUR 30,000.		
	Le Fonds Pacifique is administered by a 10-member Steering Committee, half of which is composed of representatives of the three French Pacific communities and half of which represent France (Foreign Affairs, Overseas, Economy and Finance). The chair of this committee is held alternately every two years by the President of the Government of New Caledonia and the President of French Polynesia.

Background	The Global Environment Facility (GEF) Small Grants Programme (SGP) is implemented by UNDP and executed by the United Nations Office for Project Services (UNOPS). Since its inception in 1992, the GEF SGP has been promoting grassroots NGOs or CBO to address global environmental concerns. In Vanuatu, GEF-SPG officially started with the nomination of its National
	Coordinator on September 2007. The country programme has funded 60 projects and provided more than USD 3 million in financing.
Eligibility	SGP grants are made directly to community-based organizations (CBOs) and non-governmental organizations (NGOs) in recognition of the key role they play as a resource and constituency for environment and development concerns.
Focus Areas	Biodiversity conservation, climate change mitigation and adaptation, protection of international waters, prevention of land degradation, elimination of persistent organic pollutants
Financing	The maximum grant amount per project is USD 50,000, but averages around USD 25,000. Grants of up to USD 150,000 can be provided for strategic projects. Planning grants of up to USD 2,500 can be provided in order to provide baseline costs.

Background	New Zealand High Commissioner's Head of Mission Fund (HOMF) is a small grants scheme that enables the New Zealand High Commission in Vanuatu to support activities which meet Vanuatu's development needs, consistent with the New Zealand Aid Programme/Vanuatu development strategy. Funds are limited and only the best proposals will receive assistance. The decision of the New Zealand High Commission is final and is not subject to an appeals process.
Eligibility	HOMF is primarily aimed at supporting small-scale community based development projects and activities. Recipients will normally be nongovernment organisations, schools and community groups engaged in development activities on a not-for-profit basis. Attention is also given to income generating activities for the community.
Focus Areas	 Enhancing gender equality and increasing the equitable participation of women in development Targeting assistance to the disadvantaged which may include people with disabilities, young people, and communities in remote areas who have not otherwise received assistance
Financing	The maximum grant for a single activity is VUV 800,000.

Implementation of the selected micro-projects: the project manager must sign a commitment letter addressed to the French Embassy regarding the smooth progress of the project and its implementation within six months.
